Dear Friends

So many things that we thought we could rely on, now feel very fragile and ineffective in the face of Coronavirus. And so it is natural that many of us feel afraid and fearful, like never before in our lives.

And although we've been here before, I think this hit home hardest for me on Remembrance Sunday, as I locked up the church after morning prayer. Throughout my life I've attended remembrance services, often with many hundreds in attendance. In fact, for some people, it's the only church service they attend all year. Certainly Remembrance Sunday, rather than becoming less significant as we move further away from the two world wars, seems to be the one service that has grown in numbers, certainly in the time I've been in ministry.

I remember my first church parade as a Cub Scout, many years ago, and how proud I was to march through the village. In order to show off our uniforms we weren't allowed to wear coats which - despite it being freezing - really didn't matter to me at all. But I remember standing in front of the village war memorial, too. And I also remember my friend John complaining about how cold he was, and then the sharp (and in my case, unjustified) hard clip round the ear given by PC Adams. It hurt terribly and I was crushed with embarrassment, but I also remember most of all thinking about how important it was to still be there.

COVID-19 seems to be taking so much from us at the moment. But we must faithfully live in hope, never losing sight of Jesus, who 'is the same yesterday, today, and forever.' (Hebrews 13 v8)

Always know that as followers of Jesus, 'God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble.' (Psalm 46 v1)

The latest Government and Church of England guidance means that we can no longer meet together physically on Sundays at St Margaret's, nor in our regular groups during the week, until December. This will make it much harder to encourage one another and will leave many of us feeling sad, fearful and distressed. But, the good news of Jesus always remains true. And Jesus' great commission to His disciples remains in force: 'Jesus came and spoke to them, saying, 'All authority has been given to me in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations And surely, I am with you always, to the very end of the age.' (Matthew 28 v18-20)

My friends, even in these troubled days, Jesus still has all authority. He is with us, always. And our task is as clear - if not clearer - than it has ever been. So, let me encourage you doubly in this time of trouble, to keep on praying to God for those in leadership and authority in the world, and for continued blessings on God's church and its people. And let us keep on, keeping on. Loving Jesus, one another and everyone in our parish and beyond. Serving joyfully and wholeheartedly, and continuing to share the Good News of Jesus with everyone, everywhere.



Make a Joyful Noise!





Care Committee – Medical Dogs

(Extract from Sniff magazine)

We were absolutely delighted to welcome our Royal Patron, HRH The Duchess of Cornwall, to our Centre in September.

Her Royal Highness has been following the progress of our COVID-19 detection dogs project with keen interest. When we announced the project in May she sent a message of support saying: "Having been the proud Patron of Medical Detection Dogs for six years, I have every faith that these brilliant dogs will achieve remarkable results in the fight again COVID-19." It was therefore fitting that she was one of the first in the world to see some of our COVID-19 detection dogs in training demonstrate how they are learning to detect the virus. Even in those early stages of the project our amazing Asher and brilliant Belle showed signs that it does indeed have an odour.

Her Royal Highness was greeted on arrival by CVID-19 dogs Storm and Basil who were completey unfazed by their VIP visitor and gladly enjoyed a rub under the chin. She was accompanied by our CEO, Claire Guest, as she made her way into John Church Bio Detection Centre, named in honour of our Co-Founder.



After watching Asher and Belle in the training room, The Duchess moved to the Cowan Suite where she watched chocolate Labrador, Bea and black Labrador, Marley portray passive screening. The dogs went up and down a queue of people made to look as if they were waiting in a travel hub, to detect the smell, as they could in public places during phase 2 of our trial. A dog could potentially

screen as many as 250 people per hour this way, faster and more efficiently than any other current testing methods.

At the end of her visit, Her Royal Highness, who has been Patron since 2014 said she "would like to thank everybody here who does such a fantastic job to keep everything going through these difficult times". She went on to comment on how much the charity had changed since her first visit in 2013 when we "were literally a portacabin with one dog. From the minute I visited you, I just knew that there was something very special about these dogs and as we've seen today with COVID-19, how quickly they're learning to sniff the scent.

"It will be a game changing moment for this country and the world, and luckily it's Britain that is leading the way. Thank you very much."

As she finished her remarks, Medical Alert Assistance dog, Magic, barked his support, right on cue!

Thanking Her Royal Highness for her fantastic support, Claire Guest said how proud Medical Detection Dogs is that she is our Patron and that she was "delighted to be able to show her our dogs working on COVID-19 samples". Dr Guest went on to talk about the potential impact COVID-19 detection dogs could have in the fight against this disease and how the dog's nose could be key to helping people move about freely and safely.
